In practice, games are especially beneficial for beginner-level learners as they make language practice enjoyable and memorable.

The integration of audio-visual materials, interactive software, and online communication platforms supports multimodal learning. For instance, listening to Uzbek dialogues, watching short films, or engaging in online language exchange sessions provides authentic exposure to pronunciation, intonation, and cultural context. Digital tools such as Quizlet, Kahoot, and language-learning apps also enhance vocabulary retention and independent learning.

### **Discussion.**

The findings of this study confirm that interactive teaching approaches play a significant role in addressing the challenges typically encountered in second language learning. Traditional teacher-centered instruction often limits students' opportunities for authentic communication, resulting in passive reception rather than active construction of knowledge. In contrast, interactive, student-centered teaching provides learners with meaningful practice, encourages active participation, and fosters a more natural acquisition of the Uzbek language. A key implication of these findings is the reconceptualization of the teacher's role. This shift aligns with socio-cultural and communicative theories of language acquisition, which highlight the importance of social interaction and meaningful language use in developing communicative competence. When the teacher adopts a facilitative role, learners gain more responsibility for their own learning, which increases motivation and autonomy.

However, the study also reveals that effective implementation of interactive techniques requires certain conditions. First, teachers must be adequately trained in communicative and interactive instructional strategies. Without appropriate methodological preparation, there is a risk that interactive activities may become superficial or lose their pedagogical purpose. Second, access to authentic Uzbek language materials—such as real conversations, cultural texts, and multimedia resources—is essential to ensure exposure to natural linguistic input. Third, classroom organization must support interaction, which may require smaller class sizes or structured grouping strategies to allow each learner to participate meaningfully. Finally, cultural instruction should be integrated alongside linguistic instruction, as language cannot be fully separated from the cultural context in which it is used. Cultural integration helps learners understand not only what to say, but how and when to say it appropriately in Uzbek-speaking contexts.
